

#### **SA SRC**

The SA SRC (South Australian Student Representative Council) is a state-wide student representative body of 150 students in years 10,11 & 12 run by the Commissioner of Children and Young People. The body combines regional and metro students. All of the members are committed to making changes in their schools and local communities. SA SRC members participate in student voice projects in their local school and state-wide campaigns aimed at benefiting our youth. Campaigns range from free gym membership access for youth, free public transport for students and canteen voucher campaigns for students. #### Year 11 REC PE

Year 11 Rec PE have been working on a practical exploration for skill development in invasion games. The game chosen has been a social game of ultimate frisbee, where students will demonstrate transferable skills and become aware of game strategy.



#### Year 12 REC PE

Year 12 Recreational HPE students have been analysing their performance of tennis for their first practical exploration. Students researched the history of the game, the skills and laws of the game, and how the game has changed over time. They then hit the courts to assess their current skills, and provide feedback to one another on areas of improvement. Students had to record their game play so they could analyse their performance back in the classroom. The class then spent the next few lessons practising and using drills in an attempt to improve 2 selected areas of improvement. Many focussed on getting their serving technique and accuracy right. Moving into the next few weeks they will be playing a singles and doubles tournament to see how well the students have improved over time, and how well they can run their own "Whyalla Open".

### **Aboriginal Studies**

The Aboriginal Studies class has begun the year learning all about NAIDOC week and its importance to all Australians. We looked at why we celebrate Indigenous culture and history, and how we can. The students have also analysed present NAIDOC themes and the current year's theme of 'Keep the Fire Burning; Blak, Loud and Proud'. After this analysis, students had to develop their own piece of art to encapsulate the 2024 theme. A couple of our students entered their art work and story into the NAIDOC Poster competition. Moving forward the Stage 1s are going to look at what is in the community to help support the Closing the Gap campaign, and the Stage 2s will look into bush tucker.



### Psychology Brain Dissection

In stage 1 Psychology students have been exploring neuropsychology as a class. Students have been studying the different regions of the brain and what they are responsible for. To consolidate their knowledge students completed a brain dissection where they needed to identify regions in a sheep's brain and later identify what those regions are responsible for.









#### **SAASTA**

The Whyalla SAASTA class has had an extremely busy start to 2024. We again welcomed Cowell back with their students engaging with our program. This is an excellent bond we have made over the past 2 years. In week 2 we had a visit to the school from Chrissy and her team from Power Community Ltd, along with SAASTA HQ and Flinders University staff. We spent the morning talking about culture and history, and how we are young leaders within the community. We also spent time talking about the SANTOS Aboriginal Power Cup, and practiced our football skills. This is always a great morning and we love having PAFC come to visit. We have also spent a couple of weeks getting out on country to learn about the local Barngarla region and significant places in the Whyalla/Cowell region. We travelled to Cowell and visited Port Gibbon. We have also been to Wild Dog Hill and Hummock Hill, learning about the significance of these places. Students will use these 2 excursions to help inform them when planning and creating their art pieces to represent both their connection to culture, and the connection/tribute to local Barngarla country. This artwork is then turned into our Power Cup guernsey and our banner. The art pieces will also be entered into the SAASTA art show later this year.













### **Welcome to SACE**

The South Australian Certificate of Education (SACE) is a modern, internationally-recognised secondary school qualification designed to equip you with the skills, knowledge, and personal capabilities to successfully participate in our fast-paced global society.

The SACE has evolved to provide you with more flexibility to choose subjects that reflect your interests, skills, and career goals, using a combination of SACE subjects, vocational education and training (VET), community learning, university, and TAFE studies. SACE subjects are made up of investigations, performances, and other assessment tasks to demonstrate your skills, knowledge, and personal capabilities throughout the year. Some subjects will have an end-of-year exam worth a maximum of 30% of the overall grade.

#### Your SACE journey

To complete the qualification, you will need to attain 200 credits from a selection of Stage 1 and Stage 2 subjects. A 10-credit subject is usually one semester of study, and a 20-credit subject is usually over two semesters. Here's how it works.

#### STUDENT SELECTED SUBJECTS



Choose and successfully complete a selection of Stage 1 and Stage 2 subjects, recognised VET courses, or community learning.

#### 60 credits

Choose and successfully complete a selection of Stage 2 or VET subjects worth at least 60 credits in total.

Stage 2 subjects are externally assessed by the SACE Board of South Australia.

The SACE is flexible and your schedule may differ depending on your school. The majority of students in South Australia will start their journey with Exploring Identities and Futures in Year 10, their chosen Stage 1 subjects in Year 11 (including the compulsory Maths and English choices), and their chosen Stage 2 subjects in Year 12 plus the Research Project (Activating Identities and Futures from 2025).
